Measurement. We like to use numbers as a form of measurement. For example, in our current full-time music faculty, we have over 115 collective years of teaching experience at Concordia University Chicago alone — with many thanks for Dr. Richard Fischer's 50th year of service. These numbers are impressive, but do they give us the full effect of our work?

When it comes to music, we rely on the structure of the pitches, rhythms and harmony within each measure, phrase, movement — the certainty of its beginning and end. Without some form of measured notation, the composer's intent could never be performed or recreated.

The music comes alive when the measured notation comes off the page. It's that initial spark of life at the beginning of the concert—generated by God's gift of the breath—and the subsequent breaths that sustain the music for the duration. We rely on committed musicians to accomplish this artistic performance at the deepest level possible.

You also get to experience WHY they perform. With Christ at the center, extraordinary things happen in the music. The end result is immeasurable!







Known for delivering beautifully sung, thematic programs, the students spread the Gospel message to audiences throughout the U.S. and abroad. Since 2003, the Kapelle has traveled to Argentina, Canada, Chile, England, Estonia, Finland, France, Latvia, Poland, Russia and Scotland.

Beyond touring, the Kapelle actively performs in the Chicagoland area. They have collaborated with Chicago-area choirs and orchestras over the years, namely the Chicago Arts Orchestra, Southwest Symphony Orchestra and the Symphony of Oak Park-River Forest. The Kapelle will be featured at the

Bach Cantata Series at Grace Lutheran Church, River Forest, in April 2024 to perform Weinen, Klagen, Sorgen, Zagen, BWV 12. Committed to serving the Church, the Kapelle visits congregations and schools throughout the country by leading workshops, performing assemblies and serving in worship.

DR. CHARLES BROWN serves as professor of music and is the music program lead and chair of the arts division at Concordia University Chicago. In addition to his role of conductor of the touring choir, the Kapelle, he has also taught undergraduate and graduate courses in conducting, choral literature, singer's diction,

vocal techniques and choral music education since 2000.

Dr. Brown actively guest conducts, working with such groups as the Chicago Choral Artists and the Lutheran Choir of Chicago. He's been honored to conduct choirs at district festivals for the Illinois Music Educators Conference and the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association. In his service to the Church, he has conducted the senior choir of the LCMS Institute on Liturgy, Preaching and Church Music, and numerous youth choir festivals throughout the Synod.

Specializing in topics of the male changing voice, conducting and vocal techniques, Dr. Brown has presented many workshops at professional conferences with the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA), the LCMS Institute on Liturgy, Preaching

and Church Music, Lutheran
Education Association (LEA), the
American Guild of Organists (AGO),
the Lutheran Choir of Chicago,
and the Association of Lutheran
Church Musicians (ALCM). His
continued passion for choral music
education in churches and schools
is demonstrated in the festivals
and workshops he currently
leads throughout the country.

Dr. Brown earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Westminster Choir College and his Doctor of Musical Arts in choral conducting and voice performance at the University of Arizona. He recently served on the board of directors with Anima—Glen Ellyn Children's Chorus, and has served on past committees for the Institute on Liturgy, Preaching and Church Music.



Professor **EMILY WOOCK** is in her first year on the faculty at Concordia University Chicago,

where she teaches courses in both music education and church music. She also serves as Chapel organist and teaches applied organ. In addition to her work at the University, she works part time as music director and organist at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Elmhurst, IL. She previously served churches and schools in Indiana. Trained first as an organist, she has performed throughout the United States and Germany.

Woock frequently serves as a presenter, facilitator, consultant and mentor for music educators. She holds a BA from Concordia University

Chicago, a Master of Sacred Music from the University of Notre Dame and a Master of Music Education from Anderson University. She completed her Kodály certification at the Hartt School of Music, where she studied with master teacher John Feierabend, and has since been in demand to teach professional development certification courses through the Feierabend Association for Music Education (FAME). She currently serves as treasurer on the FAME national board. Woock is in the dissertation phase of her PhD in music education from Indiana University in Bloomington, IN.


